

From what Chloe's people have been telling me, my dear brothers, it is clear that there are serious differences among you. What I mean are all these slogans that you have, like: 'I am for Paul', 'I am for Apollos', 'I am for Cephas', 'I am for Christ.' Has Christ been parcelled out? Was it Paul that was crucified for you? Were you baptised in the name of Paul?

For Christ did not send me to baptise, but to preach the Good News, and not to preach that in the terms of philosophy in which the crucifixion of Christ cannot be expressed.

Hearing that John had been arrested, Jesus went back to Galilee, and leaving Nazareth he went and settled in Capernaum, a lakeside town on the borders of Zebulun and Naphtali. In this way the prophecy of Isaiah was to be fulfilled:

'Land of Zebulun! Land of Naphtali!

Way of the sea on the far side of Jordan,

Galilee of the nations!

*The people that lived in darkness has seen a great light;
on those who dwell in the land and shadow of death
a light has dawned.'*

From that moment Jesus began his preaching with the message, 'Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is close at hand.'

As he was walking by the Sea of Galilee he saw two brothers, Simon, who was called Peter, and his brother Andrew; they were making a cast in the lake with their net, for they were fishermen. And he said to them, 'Follow me and I will make you fishers of men.' And they left their nets at once and followed him. Going on from there he saw another pair of brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John; they were in their boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. At once, leaving the boat and their father, they followed him.

He went round the whole of Galilee teaching in their synagogues, proclaiming the Good News of the kingdom and curing all kinds of diseases and sickness among the people.



God's Permissive Will

Third Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A)

When Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee... From that time on, Jesus began to preach and say, "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." Matthew 4:12, 17

When John the Baptist was arrested, his followers were likely overcome with fear and grief. The man they revered as a prophet, who fearlessly proclaimed the coming of the Messiah and called for repentance through baptism, had been imprisoned. John was arrested by Herod Antipas, the son of Herod the Great, infamous for ordering the massacre of infants in Bethlehem. Like his father, Herod Antipas was ambitious and morally corrupt. As tetrarch of Galilee and Perea under Roman authority, Herod's political survival depended on maintaining Roman favor. He often used religion to secure legitimacy among the Jewish people, though his actions routinely violated Jewish law.

Though nominally Jewish, the Herodian dynasty was of Idumean descent, tracing its lineage to Esau rather than Jacob. The Idumeans were forcibly converted to Judaism between 135–104 BC. While this history granted the Herods a claim to Jewish identity, their foreign lineage and collaboration with Rome made them unpopular with many

Jews. Herod Antipas, like his father, prioritized political cunning and personal ambition over genuine adherence to Jewish law.

When John the Baptist emerged on the scene, he proclaimed his message with fearless conviction. His central call was one of repentance and baptism for the forgiveness of sins, urging the people to prepare for the coming of the Messiah. Yet John did not shy away from addressing the moral and spiritual corruption of his time. He famously denounced the Pharisees and Sadducees as a “brood of vipers,” rebuking their hypocrisy and lack of genuine repentance. John also boldly condemned Herod Antipas for violating Jewish law by divorcing his wife and marrying Herodias, the wife of his half-brother, Philip. This marriage not only violated Mosaic Law but also reflected Herod’s ambitions to consolidate power and status. John’s fearless denunciation of sin, even among the powerful, ultimately led to his arrest and eventual martyrdom.

This historical context surrounding John’s arrest is crucial because it helps us understand God’s providence—how He permits certain evils to occur in order to bring about a greater good. Jesus Himself later affirmed John’s greatness, saying, “Among those born of women there has been none greater than John the Baptist” (Matthew 11:11). If the Son of God declared John’s greatness shortly after John’s arrest, why didn’t God miraculously free him from persecution? The answer lies in John’s mission. He had fulfilled his primary role: preparing the way for the Lord, the “Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world” (John 1:29). Once John’s mission was complete, God permitted him to seal his testimony with his own blood, offering his life as a martyr for the Lord and for the Truth that sets all people free.

Reflect today on John’s arrest and consider how you might have reacted if you had been one of his disciples. From an earthly perspective, martyrdom is difficult to comprehend or accept, especially in our own lives or in the lives of those we love. Though John’s arrest and subsequent martyrdom likely brought fear and grief to his disciples, shaking their sense of security, from an eternal perspective, John’s martyrdom was his greatest act of witness. It fulfilled his mission by pointing his disciples—and all of us—toward the true Prophet and Messiah, Jesus Christ. John is forever glorified in Heaven, and in the end, that is all that truly matters. As we honor John’s unwavering faith, seek to embrace God’s permissive will in your own life. Even in the face of suffering or evil, trust that God, in His providence, can bring about a greater good if we surrender ourselves fully to Him.

My provident and loving God, You permit evil to touch the lives of Your faithful followers, knowing that in Your perfect Wisdom, You can bring forth a greater good. Grant me the heart of a martyr, filled with courage and trust, whenever I face injustice in my life. Help me to unite my every trial to Yours, in imitation of Saint John the Baptist and Your own Passion and Death. Jesus, I trust in You.

FR JOEL VILLANUEVA OSJ

Hello dear parishioners of Saint Patrick Cathedral. I am Rev. Fr. Joel Maranan Villanueva, OSJ of the Congregation of the Oblates of Saint Joseph. I came from San Juan, Batangas, Philippines. I was born May 7, 1983. I had my perpetual profession of the vows of poverty, chastity and obedience on August 15, 2011. I was ordained a priest on June 9, 2012.

I thank our Bishop, Most. Rev. George Kolodziej, SDS for trusting me to be part of the pastoral team of Saint Patrick as assistant priest.

I arrived in Australia for the first time on September 20, 2022. My first pastoral assignment was in the parish of the Holy Family in Albany and served as an assistant to the parish priest and chaplain at Saint Joseph's College.

Before coming to Australia, I served as a formator and educator of our seminarians and a school director. My passion for education, formation and catechesis helped me to establish the Oblates of Saint Joseph Institute of Catechetics and Tanglaw Dunong Scholarship Foundation, Inc. I also served for two years as the President of the Association of Religious of the Archdiocese of Lipa (ARAL). Since 2016, I have been actively propagating the Word of God in different social media platforms.

Those who belong to the Order of Catechumenate are not yet baptised and therefore will be receiving the Sacraments of Initiation (Baptism, Holy Eucharist and Confirmation) at Easter Vigil on the 4th of April. On the other hand, those who have already been validly baptised from another Christian church will be welcomed and later on received

LECTIO DIVINA

STEPS OF *LECTIO DIVINA*

- 1. Prepare (Silencio):** Take a few moments to quiet yourself, get in a comfortable position, and become aware of God's presence.
- 2. Read (Lectio):** Read the Scripture passage slowly, out loud if possible. Listen for a nudge: What words or images is the Spirit drawing you toward today?
- 3. Meditate (Meditatio):** Re-read the Scripture passage, lingering over the person/word/phrase that captured your attention. Let your imagination engage the story/text. Reflect on how it might intersect with your life today.
- 4. Pray (Oratio):** Read through the Scripture passage another time, allowing the Scripture to lead you into a prayer/response to God. Talk to God about what has come to mind, and how He might be inviting you to respond.
- 5. Contemplate (Contemplatio):** Rest in the awareness of God's presence, remaining open to anything else the Holy Spirit might stir in your heart. If your mind wanders, gently redirect your thoughts toward God. Simply be still. Expect nothing. Enjoy a moment of fellowship with God that goes deeper than words. God loves you.

Understanding the documents of Vatican II – Pope Leo

Recently Pope Leo began a series of talks at the Wednesday General Audience, with catechesis on the documents of Vatican Council II. He began with the Dogmatic Constitution Dei Verbum, on the divine Revelation: an important document of the Council. In the words of Jesus: “No longer do I call you servants ...”, (Jn 15:15). Jesus Christ has transformed our relationship with God to a relationship of friendship. The only condition of the new covenant is love.

In the Christian Revelation, that is, when God took human form in his Son, the Covenant is new and eternal, and nothing can separate us from God’s love. As in the experience of human friendship, the relationship is nurtured by the exchange of true words.

The document reminds us that God speaks to us, and by speaking to us, God is revealed as one who invites us into friendship. So, the first attitude to cultivate is listening, so that the divine Word may penetrate our minds and hearts. At the same time, we need to speak with God, to reveal ourselves. Prayer calls us to live and cultivate friendship with the Lord.

For community liturgical prayer, the readings of the Word of God are already chosen for us, because we follow the liturgical cycle. So we need to make time for prayer, meditation and reflection on those readings, as an important part of the Christian’s day and week.
