SCRIPTURE REFLECTION. "WE SHALL BE LIKE

GOD" proclaims John in the second reading. Prior to saying this, he affirms that "we are already children of God." John speaks of the need of the human faith to be nourished in order to flourish. Underlying this affirmation is the beautiful truth that we are God's children because God has created us and continues to re-create us. God's love and generosity are not just evident in making us His children, but more fully, God sustains us in His love and generosity by re-creating us. We do realise the human possibility of breaking away from our relationship with God. Sin manifests this break away, severing and isolating ourselves from divine grace. It is due to this human possibility that God unfailingly offers his love and generosity that we may remain on the path towards freely loving Him as our Father in heaven. Our first reading confirms this singular path that leads us to this form of love that is salvific.

"THE ONLY NAME WHICH WE CAN BE SAVED," speaks the author of the Acts of the Apostles (first reading), is Jesus Christ "whom God raised from the dead." Societies through time have spoken of different forms of deities yet there is only one God who truly saves. It is by this truth that the post-Resurrection church spoke of their mission. They manifested their faith in the risen Christ through 'acts of kindness.' James 2:24 describes the motivation of the post-Resurrection church: "...a person is justified by works and not by faith alone."

Bishop Mar Mari Emmanuel, the Assyrian Orthodox Bishop who was stabbed repeatedly last Monday while delivering his homily in his church in Wakeley in Western Sydney, offers his forgiveness to the 16-year-old perpetrator and calls for his followers to be calm in the face of evil. Bishop Mar said: "I need you to act Christ-like. The Lord Jesus never taught us to fight. The Lord Jesus never taught us to retaliate. The Lord Jesus never said to us, 'An eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth."

Bishop Mar demonstrates great faith by taking the path of peace rather than violence in dealing with human evil intentions. Human faith needs to be willed in consonance with Christ's teaching and to act on it. We are called to live our faith by being Christ-like in all human endeavours.

"I AM THE GOOD SHEPHERD...I LAY DOWN MY LIFE FOR MY SHEEP" (Gospel reading) shows the heart of Christ who seeks peace and not violence in the face of adversities. He models how it is like to be 'Christ-like.' We can be Christ-like by 'laying down our life' rather than being vengeful and retaliatory. Christ indeed is the Good Shepherd who chose the path of forgiveness and peace in the face of unimaginable atrocities committed by his enemies. Yet, in and through all these, Christ is the only name which can truly save us.

We are all called to be Christ-like by living our faith in the manner that Christ has shown to the world. If we are on the side of Christ, we will take the path of peace rather than violence. If we are on the side of Christ, we shall be promoters of justice and forgiveness. If we are on the side of Christ, we shall see Christ's presence in every person around us.
