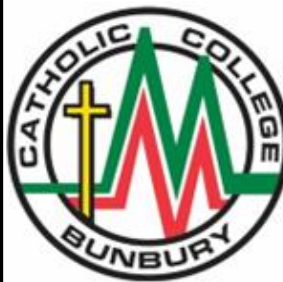

MESSAGE FROM THE BISHOP

Dear Brothers and Sisters

The Christian faith is the most persecuted religion in the world today. Living so far from countries in which this persecution is taking place, we can feel the problem to be remote.

I recall some years ago hearing of an elderly mother and grandmother who insisted that her children and grandchildren leave her to face death at the hands of ISIS because she was too frail to escape with them.

Our brothers and sisters in many parts of the world are suffering death, imprisonment, torture and the loss of their property because they won't renounce their faith. Persecution is not limited to past centuries.

Jesus spoke too of being ridiculed and of "those who abuse you and speak all kinds of calumny against you" on his account (Matthew 5:10-12). He warned us that, when our faith is in conflict with many views and moral standards today, "if they persecuted me they will persecute you" (John 15: 20-21).

What I ask Catholics to consider doing

On Wednesday, 23 November, the Church prays for persecuted Christians. I ask every Catholic in our Diocese, first, to say a prayer for our persecuted brothers and sisters.

Second, it will be even better if they could go to Mass on that day.

Finally, I ask the suffering to offer their sufferings that day in solidarity for persecuted Christians.

Many in our Diocese are suffering physical pains, loss of independence, psychological pains and mental illness; loneliness, family and work problems; family stresses and struggles with spouses, family members and friends who are suffering addictions. Then there are all the anxieties stemming from financial stresses and employment insecurity. The list is endless because people's circumstances can be so different.

Let us all do what we can to be in solidarity with the suffering of our persecuted brothers and sisters.

FAITH EDUCATION CORNER

Anointing of the Sick

St Paul writes 'If one member (of the Body of Christ) suffers, all suffer together...' (1Cor 12:26).

We are all called to treat the sick with kindness and love, recognising our union in Christ with the suffering member. And, in fact, the very act of friendship can help the healing process. Everyone can contribute in some way to the healing of the sick.

Visitation and care of the sick is an important pastoral activity, reaching out in love to suffering members of the community and to their families.

Visiting the sick is one of the works of mercy mentioned by Jesus in the gospel of Mathew (25:31-46).

In cases of serious illness, the family can ask the priest to celebrate the sacrament of Anointing of the Sick. The gospels show Jesus always concerned for the sick and dying. Through this sacrament the Church communicates to the sick person a new **strength to cope with the suffering**.

Since Vatican II, the emphasis in the sacrament is on prayer for physical and spiritual healing for all seriously ill persons.

The sacrament may be received a number of times, and may be celebrated as part of Eucharistic celebration. Hence, the parish practice of a Healing Mass every month.

The sign of the sacrament is the **laying of hands** on the head of the sick person, followed by **anointing** on the forehead and hands with oil. The anointing is accompanied with these words:

Through this holy anointing, may the Lord in his love and mercy help you, with the grace of the Holy Spirit.

May the Lord who frees you from sin, save you and raise you up.

It is always preferable for a community dimension when celebrating this sacrament. This shows the concern of all members of the community for one another.

These various signs of the sacraments become **channels of God's abundant love through the merits of Jesus Christ**, the greatest sacrament of God's saving love, and the founder and life-source of all the sacraments.

SOCIAL JUSTICE SNIPPETS

Cardinal Pietro Parolin has told world leaders in Egypt for the United Nations climate summit that they have a "a moral obligation" to safeguard the planet and to offer aid to people suffering the "humanitarian impacts caused by climate change". Source: CNS.

The Vatican secretary of state led the Holy See's official delegation to COP27, the 27th Conference of the Parties to the UN Framework Convention on Climate Change, meeting in Sharm el-Sheikh, on November 6-18.

The cardinal told world leaders yesterday that "the growing phenomenon of migrants being displaced" by climate change is something they must act on because "they lack access to international protection" recognising them as deserving special care.

And, he said, if it is not possible to give them special status as refugees, "it is important to recognise migration as a form of adaptation and to increase the availability and flexibility of pathways for regular migration".

The time has come for "individual and collective conversion and for concrete decisions that can no longer be postponed", Cardinal Parolin said.

While the pandemic and wars rightfully concern global leaders because of "their serious ethical, social and economic consequences" and the risk they pose to global security and to food security, he said, they cannot be allowed to overshadow the work of COP27.

"Climate change will not wait for us," he said. "Our world is now far too interdependent and cannot permit itself to be structured into unsustainable isolated blocks of countries. This is a time for international and intergenerational solidarity. We need to be responsible, courageous and forward-looking not just for ourselves, but for our children." CNS
