





**SCRIPTURE REFLECTION.** Christ's mission has been fulfilled. He has died and is risen. He has now ascended into heaven to be with His Father. So, what has Christ fulfilled?

"CHRIST HAS DIED." Christ's death is salvific for all humanity. Death can be the reality that ends all possibilities if we permit it to be. Through his death, Christ ended any thought that death is an end or a dead end. By rising from the dead, Christ has regained the blissful eternity that God has always accorded to humanity. Sin impeded its realisation, due mainly to humanity's wilful insistence to live outside God's love. Christ changed this course of humanity that would sadly have led women and men to absolute estrangement from God forever. Christ has changed all that by revealing that His death has redefined what temporal death is all about. He's revealed that death is but merely a threshold that leads to eternity. We can now be confident to go through death's threshold knowing and believing that what lies ahead is not hopelessness, but rather, the promise of eternal comfort from God Himself.

"CHRIST IS RISEN." As he has promised, Christ rose from the dead after three days in the tomb. People speculated and doubted his resurrection, convincing others that his body was merely taken away and hence, no resurrection had ever happened. But the experience of the apostles disproved all that. The Bible bears the records of their encounters with Christ whom they had witnessed to have died on the cross. His body was not stolen, but Christ lives. More than just fulfilling his promise to come out of death on the third day, Christ's resurrection fully reveals that our God is the God of life, and death has no power over God. Since God is the God of life, Christ's resurrection has gifted humanity with the opportunity to lead a life that is Christ-like and that which can lead to salvation. Christ's resurrection guarantees us that human efforts will not be in vain, rather, it has been given the power to rise from adversities, including sin.

"CHRIST WILL COME AGAIN." The Acts of the Apostles reveal to us that "Jesus will come back." Christ reassures us that He will continue to abide in us, even though he has promised to send the Holy Spirit to the world. The presence of the Holy Spirit is providential because the Sprit will constantly reveal to us the meaning of what Christ has done and has taught. This is important since we need to be guided by the truth that is revealed by Christ. This truth is crucial as we try to navigate through this time in-between the postresurrection Church and his second coming (Parousia). What do we do then? St Paul in the second reading tells us that during this period we should never retire from seeking perfection, of fulfilling or realising who we are as children of God. Human fulness could only be achieved through believing and fulfilling Christ's commandments. With divine counsel, let us seek the path of perfection where we reach our fullness by allowing Christ to be wholly in us. "Solo Dios basta" ("Only God suffices.") as St. Teresa of Avila believes so.
