

FINANCIAL REPORT FOR BUNBURY PARISH FOR THE YEAR END-ED 30 JUNE 2025. Our financial year recorded a 3% cashflow surplus, similar to the previous year. Loan repayments of \$66,493 were funded from both the surplus and existing cash reserves.

Income increased by 14%, with a key contributor being rent from the previously untenanted commercial property. Sacrificial giving increased by 7%, for which we thank your generosity.

Expenses also increased by 14%, due to a period of extra priests, and more employee hours.

The challenge for the year ahead to manage expenses, including building expenses and to maintain existing cash reserves. A summary of income and expenses can be found on the Cathedral noticeboard.

For your selfless giving of time and treasure, the Parish Finance Committee thanks you. (Thank you to Brian Castieau for the report.)

PPC POST

We would like to continue to remind everyone of some of the changes that have been introduced during the past two weeks in our minister's movements during Holy Mass. These changes came about through series of parish consultations. Thank you to those parishioners who have already provided feedback. We will record your suggestions/concerns and attend to them once the trial period has concluded.

Changes prior to the commencement of Mass:

- 1. Promptly at the starting time the bells will ring.
- **2.** Parishioners will stand (as previously done)
- **3.** The commentator will welcome the faithful, encourage connection between those participating in the Mass and introduce the message in the readings of the day.
- **4.** Parishioners will be encouraged to join in singing the gathering hymn.

To Liturgy of the Word

- 1. There will be 1 reader of the Word.
- **2.** Psalmist may or may not sing the Responsorial Psalm. If the Psalm is spoken then it will commence with the response, i.e. *God, in your goodness, you have made a home for the poor.*
- **3.** The Commentator will read the Universal Prayers (Prayer of the Faithful) at the conclusion of Mass.
- 4. Join the procession at the conclusion of Mass.

<u>Changes to the movements of Eucharistic Ministers of</u> Holy Communion (EMHC) during Mass:

- > The EMHC's joining the procession.
- > The EMHC's approaching the Altar once the Priest-Celebrant consumes the Precious Body of Christ (They remain at their seats and kneel as part of the body of the Church).
- > The Acolyte will distribute Communion in the body of the Church. An EMHC will distribute Holy Communion upstairs.
- > Blessings will be offered verbally (There will be no Precious Body held in the fingers, or contact made).
- > Once finished distribution of Holy Communion, EMHC's will wash their hands to remove traces of the Precious Body.
- > Those EMHC's taking the Precious Body to the housebound will be invited to the Altar and blessed by the Priest-Celebrant after the Prayer After communion.
- > EMHC's will join the procession at the conclusion of Mass.



Season of Creation and 2 new Saints

Christians across the world marked **Creation Day** on Mon 1 Sept, the annual celebration of the mystery of Creation. Last Sunday Pope Leo XIV recalled that Pope Francis instituted the **World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation**, saying it is "now more urgent and important than ever."

"Together with all Christians, we celebrate the **Season of Creation** until 4 October, the feast of Saint Francis of Assisi," he said. "Let us praise God and renew our commitment not to spoil His gift, but to care for our common home."

Blessed **Pier Giorgio Frassati** and Blessed **Carlo Acutis** will be canonized in Rome on 7 September. They led quite different lives, but were united in their love for Christ and their ability to impart that love to others. Pier Giorgio Frassati, an Italian, was a struggling student who excelled in mountain climbing. He had complete faith in God and persevered through college, dedicating himself to helping the poor and supporting church social teaching. He died at age 24 in 1925 from polio.

One of the things that most impressed a non-Christian person who was acquainted with Carlo was the witness of his love and concern for the poor - interacting with a homeless man who would sit at the entrance of the church, and taking dishes of food to people living on the streets. Carlo was a faithful friend, and was known for standing up for kids at school who got bullied, especially those with disabilities. He died at age 15 in 2006 from leukemia.

HEARING AID LOOP





'And indeed, which of you here, intending to build a tower, would not first sit down and work out the cost to see if he had enough to complete it? Otherwise, if he laid the foundation and then found himself unable to finish the work, the onlookers would all start making fun of him and saying, "Here is a man who started to build and was unable to finish." Or again, what king marching to war against another king would not first sit down and consider whether with ten thousand men he could stand up to the other who advanced against him with twenty thousand? If not, then while the other king was still a long way off, he would send envoys to sue for peace. So in the same way, none of you can be my disciple unless he gives up all his possessions.'

"'Hating' So As To Love"

Great crowds were traveling with Jesus, and he turned and addressed them, "If anyone comes to me without hating his father and mother, wife and children, brothers and sisters, and even his own life, he cannot be my disciple." Luke 14:25–26

Why would Jesus exhort the "great crowds" to hate their families? In fact, Jesus went even further than that. He said they must also hate their own lives. If they do not, then they cannot be His disciples. One thing that this shocking teaching did was to shake people out of their lukewarm faith. Sometimes we think of Jesus only as a kind and gentle soul Who always brightens people's days. We see images painted of the smiling Jesus Who always made people feel welcomed and loved. And though these images have truth, it is also true that one way He brightened their days was by challenging them to the core of their being to convert. And that is what Jesus does today in our Gospel.

To hate your father, mother, children, siblings and even your very self is obviously not a reference to the sin of hate that flows from anger. In this case, the word "hate" refers to the best way to love others and to love even your own self. To begin, let's look at the

conclusion. Jesus said that this form of hate is a requirement of being His disciple. This is the key. Unless we are first and foremost a disciple of Christ, we cannot love others and we will not even love ourselves in the proper way. "Hate" in this context refers to selfish attachments. This means that people and things can easily get in the way of our love of God. When they do, we must see them as an obstacle to both the love of God. as well as to the authentic love of others and even ourselves. For example, if a family member were to demand in some way that you love them more than you love God, then this must be rejected with passion. This could be referred to as holy hatred of the temptation, not the person. Say a spouse criticizes you for attending Mass and tries to stop you from doing so. If you listen to them, then you are placing them before God. Or say someone hurts you and you choose to forgive them, only to have a family member challenge you and try to stir up anger in you toward that person. If you listen to them, then you are not listening to God. In these cases, we must "hate" in the sense that we reject the temptation.

What about yourself? How do you hate yourself? This is a reference to the many ways that our disordered appetites are drawn to sin. If we indulge in the disordered desires, or even worse, if we treat those disordered desires as normal and good for us, then we have chosen the disordered desire over God. In that case, we must learn to hate and reject the selfish and disordered desire, choosing God and His will alone.

When we are able to choose the love of God first and foremost in our lives, rejecting the temptations that come through others and even the temptations within our disordered desires, then, and only then, are we in a position to love others and ourselves, in the right way. Jesus obviously wants us to love others and ourselves. But this is only possible when our love is pure and holy and flows from the love of God. Any other form of "love" is not love at all. It is a selfish attachment that hinders our true mission as lovers of God and instruments of that love to others.

Reflect, today, upon the passion that you must have to reject all forms of sin. This includes sin that tempts you through the mediation of your family and friends. It also includes every form of temptation that arises within you on account of your disordered human nature. This holy hatred is an act of love in that it seeks to eliminate everything that keeps you from true love. Choose, today, to be a faithful disciple of Jesus and commit yourself to reject all that seeks to interfere with this choice. Doing so will not only increase your love for God, it will also increase your love for others, and even your love for your own soul.

My passionate Lord, You exhorted the crowds to reject every form of temptation that interfered with their love of You. Please fill my soul with a holy hatred for sin and all temptation so that I can reject them with passion. May I love You above all things and from that love, love others and even my own soul with Your Sacred Heart. Jesus, I trust in You.
