# Flavour, Preservation and Purity

Fifth Sunday in Ordinary Time (Year A)



*The Sermon on the Mount (Cosimo Rosselli, 1439-1507)*

*Jesus said to his disciples: “You are the salt of the earth. But if salt loses its taste, with what can it be seasoned? It is no longer good for anything but to be thrown out and trampled underfoot.” Matthew 5:13*

Sodium chloride, also known as salt, is one of the most commonly used substances in the world, used for seasoning, preserving, and purifying. Sodium chloride is a very stable compound and cannot lose its flavour unless there is a chemical reaction or dissolution. Why, then, did Jesus suggest that salt could lose its taste? One likely explanation is that the salt used in ancient Palestine could indeed lose its flavour due to impurities and the conditions in which it was stored.

The Dead Sea, located in modern-day southeast Israel, contains a massive deposit of salt and other minerals. According to biblical history, Lot's wife was turned into a pillar of salt in this region. Because of the vast salt and mineral deposits, the area surrounding the Dead Sea is desolate.

Salt extracted from the Dead Sea was never pure sodium chloride. Gypsum and other minerals were also present, making the salt impure. If this salt were stored improperly or came into contact with water, the sodium chloride could dissolve and wash away,

leaving behind the solid residue of minerals. These residual substances, like gypsum, had the appearance of salt but were tasteless and useless for flavouring, preserving, and purifying purposes. When this happened, the “salt” lost its taste. In light of this explanation, Jesus’ teaching becomes especially clear.

The first notable feature of salt is its ability to add flavour to food. By calling His disciples the “salt of the earth,” Jesus was instructing them to enhance the “flavour” of the world by bringing the truth of the Gospel and the joy of His message to others. A Christian life lived in fidelity to Christ would make the world a better and more virtuous place, just as salt enhances the flavour of food.

Salt is also commonly used for preservation. Before the age of refrigerators and freezers, salt was mixed with food to prevent corruption, by drawing out moisture and hindering bacteria and other microorganisms. Though this practice is still used today, it was especially vital in ancient times. By being the “salt of the earth,” Jesus was calling His disciples to preserve the world from moral decay. Through their witness and proclamation of the Gospel, they were to act as a preservative against sin and spiritual ruin. If they were to “lose their taste,” they would become indistinguishable from the rest of the world and ineffective in their mission. Hence, Jesus was exhorting them—and us—to avoid becoming watered down and bland in our witness to the Gospel.

Lastly, salt held a significant role in Jewish religious practices, symbolizing purity and consecration. In sacrificial rituals, salt was used to consecrate offerings, as commanded in Leviticus: “You shall season all your grain offerings with salt. Do not let the salt of the covenant with your God be lacking from your grain offering. On every offering you shall offer salt” (Leviticus 2:13). By seasoning their offerings with salt, the Israelites preserved the sacrifices from decay, making them pure. This practice reflects the disciples’ role in purifying the world through their example of holiness, their lives of self-sacrifice, and their participation in Christ’s redemptive work. They were to live lives of integrity, leading others to God through the purity of their hearts and their unwavering commitment to His will.

Reflect today on this powerful metaphor of being the salt of the earth. The world desperately needs the enriching “flavour” of God’s grace. Without Him, the world is left to corruption and decay. With God, we, and those we serve, are preserved as pure and holy offerings, adding to His glory and growing in holiness. Be the salt of the earth. Do not become watered down in your faith. Remain steadfast in your fidelity to Christ and His Gospel, and you will transform the world around you. In doing so, you will not only glorify God but will also share in His eternal joy.

*Most pure and enriching Lord, You alone enrich and enhance our lives, preserve us from sin, and make us a pure offering to Your Father. Please use me to be an instrument of Your grace to the world, making me the “salt” that remains pure and effective, to bring Your saving truth to the ends of the earth. Jesus, I trust in You.*


## THE NICENE CREED

**SPECIAL YEAR OF ST. FRANCIS.** Pope Leo XIV has proclaimed a Special Year of

St. Francis to commemorate the 800th anniversary of the death of St. Francis of Assisi. This Jubilee Year, running from January 10, 2026, to January 10, 2027, aims to renew the message of peace and holiness of life. The decree, issued by the Apostolic Penitentiary, includes plenary indulgences for those who participate in pilgrimages to Franciscan conventional churches or places of worship dedicated to St. Francis. The Jubilee also encourages the faithful to live authentically as peacemakers, reflecting St. Francis' teachings on peace, care for creation, poverty, and humility. You are invited daily to say the **Prayer of St. Francis** which is a **Prayer for Peace**. You may wish to offer daily this prayer and pray for peace in the different parts of the world where there are conflicts:



Lord, make me an instrument of your peace:

where there is hatred, let me sow love;

where there is injury, pardon;

where there is doubt, faith;

where there is despair, hope;

where there is darkness, light;

where there is sadness, joy.

On the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, 2 February, Bishop George Kolodziej, SDS DD, Bishop of Bunbury, celebrated Mass at the Carmelite Monastery to observe the **World Day of Prayer for Consecrated Women and Men**. Priests from our diocese belonging to different orders, the Sisters of the Order of Carmelites Discalced (OCD), Sr Christine Clarke PBVM (Mercy Sisters) and Sr. Pauline Dundon RSJ (MacKillop Sisters) were in attendance.

In 1997, Saint John Paul II called for a day of prayer for women and men in consecrated life and to be promoted throughout the universal Church.<sup>5</sup>

Some Christian women and men respond to God's call to become followers of Jesus through profession of vows and a life of dedicated to prayer and service.

Contemplative nuns, religious sisters and brothers, religious priests, and monks consecrate their lives through the profession of the evangelical vows of poverty, chastity and obedience and live as part of a community. Single lay people may choose to be consecrated virgins and hermits, make private vows to the local bishop as they live out their vocation in various walks of life. Secular institutes are another form of living the consecrated life as single people. Those who become followers of Jesus through the consecrated life bless the Church.

The celebration is attached to the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord on February 2nd. This Feast is also known as Candle Mass; the day on which candles are blessed symbolizing who is the light of the world. So too, those in consecrated life are called to reflect the light of Jesus Christ to all peoples.

The consecrated life is one way that women and men live out their baptismal commitment as followers of Jesus. Those who choose to live a consecrated life give public intentional witness to the universal call to a life of holiness.

### Introducing the New Chancellor of the Diocese of Bunbury

Kerrie's primary responsibility as Chancellor will be the fulfilment of these canonical duties. In addition, and as delegated, she will support the Office of the Bishop, by providing pastoral and strategic oversight of staff and their functions in collaboration with the Episcopal Council. Kerrie will also oversee particular projects that serve the mission of evangelisation.

The office of Chancellor is an important canonical role within the life of the Diocese. In accordance with the law of the Church, the Chancellor is entrusted with ensuring that diocesan acts and decrees are properly prepared, issued, and securely archived, and that official Church documents are accurately recorded and certified. In this way, the Chancellor serves the good order, transparency, and pastoral governance of the Diocese.



In her work, Kerrie will collaborate closely with the Vicar General, the Episcopal Vicar for Clergy, and the staff of the Chancery and diocesan agencies. Her role is intended to support and strengthen our shared ministry, fostering communication, collaboration, and synodal practice across the Diocese.

A principal focus of Kerrie's work in the coming months will be the preparation and coordination of the Diocesan Synodal Assembly to be held in August, when representatives from our parishes, schools, and diocesan agencies will gather for prayerful listening and discernment. This Assembly will be an important step as we work together to prepare a pastoral plan for the future of our Diocese.

Kerrie takes up this role on a part-time basis. I am grateful to Kerrie for her willingness to serve the Diocese of Bunbury at this important time in our synodal journey. I ask you to join me in warmly welcoming Kerrie and in supporting her with your prayers.

Entrusting this appointment and the life of our Diocese to the intercession of Our Lady, Help of Christians, and with gratitude for your faithful service to God's people.

# LECTIO DIVINA

## STEPS OF *LECTIO DIVINA*

- 1. Prepare (Silencio):** Take a few moments to quiet yourself, get in a comfortable position, and become aware of God's presence.
- 2. Read (Lectio):** Read the Scripture passage slowly, out loud if possible. Listen for a nudge: What words or images is the Spirit drawing you toward today?
- 3. Meditate (Meditatio):** Re-read the Scripture passage, lingering over the person/word/phrase that captured your attention. Let your imagination engage the story/text. Reflect on how it might intersect with your life today.
- 4. Pray (Oratio):** Read through the Scripture passage another time, allowing the Scripture to lead you into a prayer/response to God. Talk to God about what has come to mind, and how He might be inviting you to respond.
- 5. Contemplate (Contemplatio):** Rest in the awareness of God's presence, remaining open to anything else the Holy Spirit might stir in your heart. If your mind wanders, gently redirect your thoughts toward God. Simply be still. Expect nothing. Enjoy a moment of fellowship with God that goes deeper than words. God loves you.

## Understanding the documents of Vatican II – Pope Leo

Recently Pope Leo began a series of talks at the Wednesday General Audience, with catechesis on the documents of Vatican Council II. He began with the Dogmatic Constitution Dei Verbum, on the divine Revelation: an important document of the Council. In the words of Jesus: “No longer do I call you servants ...”, (Jn 15:15). Jesus Christ has transformed our relationship with God to a relationship of friendship. The only condition of the new covenant is love.

In the Christian Revelation, that is, when God took human form in his Son, the Covenant is new and eternal, and nothing can separate us from God’s love. As in the experience of human friendship, the relationship is nurtured by the exchange of true words.

The document reminds us that God speaks to us, and by speaking to us, God is revealed as one who invites us into friendship. So, the first attitude to cultivate is listening, so that the divine Word may penetrate our minds and hearts. At the same time, we need to speak with God, to reveal ourselves. Prayer calls us to live and cultivate friendship with the Lord.

For community liturgical prayer, the readings of the Word of God are already chosen for us, because we follow the liturgical cycle. So we need to make time for prayer, meditation and reflection on those readings, as an important part of the Christian’s day and week.
